Kamdhenu steel to make structures quake resistant

The next generation steel gives optimum security to high rise structures making them fully quake resistant.

Hyderabad: Gurugram-based steel manufacturer and distributor Kamdhenu Steel which is introducing interlock steel in the country is optimistic about the company's growth at about 15 per cent year-on-year while the industry growth average stands around 7-10 per cent.

The company is launching its new Kamdhenu NXT interlock steel which it claims to be 2.5 times stronger than the existing steel available. Suitable primarily for high rise buildings, the company wants to target it for the infrastructure sector too. The next generation steel gives optimum security to high rise structures making them fully quake resistant. The company which has been in the steel business

since 1984 has been supplying for government infrastructure projects.

Kamdhenu Steel director Sunil Agarwal told Telangana Today, “We have developed the interlock steel with research spread over last three years. We tied up with IIT Roorkee to test the strength of the steel before rolling the product.”

“We had been a leading manufacturer of thermo mechanical treatment (TMT) steel for several decades. We have a capacity of 4.5 million tonne per annum through our own units and partner units across the country. The company has 60 franchisee manufacturing units and 10,000 dealers. Telangana and Andhra Pradesh generate 0.2 million tonne capacity,” he informed.

The company may look at more units in Telangana in near future through franchisee route.

When asked if the company is looking at export opportunities, he said, “In the overseas markets, there is competition from steel coming from China, Ukraine, Brazil and Russia and exports is not that lucrative.”
